# **One Child at a Time**

## Kehillah Fund Schools Continue to Flourish

Our partner schools have continued to provide students with innovative learning opportunities and a culture that inspires growth. From new artist-in-residence programs, to experiential gardening projects, to programs that support teachers, here's what's been happening at our schools.

At Shaarei Chinuch Day School, the community's only Montessori school, students were empowered to make their own class rules through the Class Constitution Project. "The children came up with the rules and consequences and agreed on them. It was amazing," said Daniella Adar, Co-Director.

The exciting new kriah program at Joan Dachs Bais Yaakov (JDBY) is built on a skills-based curriculum that includes multi-sensory and phonemic awareness. The new program, under the guidance of Kriah Coordinator Esther Mina Katz, aims to help all students, regardless of their abilities, to grasp the material and gain the skills needed for reading Hebrew confidently.

Torah Academy of Buffalo Grove is teaching Chumash in a dynamic and skill-based way. The approach creates connections with words in the Siddur, Chumash, Bentcher, and Hagaddah. According to Elisa Zehnwirth, Principal, "The goal is to make the learning meaningful and memorable through context and cross-connections, and it has been a tremendous success."

Yeshiva Ohr Boruch is constantly working to ensure optimal teaching practices in the classroom. One focus this year has been on developing the students' independence in learning. "Our ultimate goal is to teach skills so that the child can learn on his own," said Rabbi Heshy Forster, Menahel.

Arie Crown Hebrew Day School's robust professional development program continues to support their teachers and enhance the school atmosphere. The theme for this year was student relationships. "I am trying to be more cognizant of what I am about to say and how it impacts children," said Meira Schur. Another teacher, Roni Lichtman, explained, "I really try to see each child as an 'olam bifnei atzma' and to guide and nurture her accordingly."

Keshet is back with a renewed focus on their Literacy Program. The school's newly assigned literacy specialist has been working directly with students while also guiding their teachers. Dr. Melinda Remaly, Director of Education, explained, "Supporting literacy provides access not only to the broader picture of language and curriculum, but also to the world of literacy and general knowledge."

Akiba Schechter Jewish Day School has launched an initiative called the Artist-in-Residence Program. The workshops include Percussion, Improv, Design & Construction, and more. "It's allowed our students and staff to lean into some of the soft skills we want to focus on, like empathy and listening skills," said Miriam Kass, Principal.

Once the students at JCFS Knapp Yeshiva were able to return full-time, they fully benefited from the school's programs. Rabbi David Rosenberg, Coordinator of Jewish Educational Services, shared, "It has been gratifying to see the success the students have had this year as they make tremendous progress, with some children feeling a sense of ownership of their learning for the very first time."

**REACH**, a professional development and resource program under the auspices of the Associated Talmud Torahs, has begun an offering called Collaborative Problem Solving. The program gives parents the tools to be proactive rather than reactive when dealing with parenting challenges and has been a great success.

One of the many exciting programs at Cheder Lubavitch Hebrew Day School this year was the Shemittah Fair. After the 8th-grade girls learned about Shemittah in detail, they put together an experiential fair with workshops, skits, posters, audiovisual presentations, and more to educate the rest of the school. "The girls were so proud! It was an empowering opportunity for our 8th graders to use their talents to provide this excitement and learning for our entire school," said Elkie Wolf, Judaic Principal.

# The Achdus Fund

## Making the Gift of Education Available to All

Day schools make every effort to keep tuition affordable, but the financial obligation is still daunting for many. The Achdus Fund is a special allocation the Kehillah Fund gives day schools to support families in need. The funding is distributed annually based on schools' requests.

While the Fund's financial assistance is vital, equally important is the sense of belonging it offers to those in need. "The Achdus Fund does two very important things for families that are truly struggling—it helps keep tuition as low as possible in a way that maintains their dignity, and it creates a warm feeling that the community cares about them and the chinuch of their family," says Rabbi Avrohom S. Brownstein, Executive Vice President of Joan Dachs Bais Yaakov-Yeshivas Tiferes Tzvi (JDBY-YTT).

In October 2021, the Kehillah Fund distributed \$92,500 in Achdus funding for 185 students, making a difference for 87 families.

At Shaarei Chinuch, offering aid for eligible families was something the relatively new school had found difficult to provide. The school is grateful to receive Achdus funding to help families with tuition assistance.

"We are so thankful for all the support Hillel Torah receives from the Kehillah Fund and the direct benefit it has for our students," said Chaya Gordon Burstyn, Director of Communications. "The Achdus funding allows our families to give their children a vitally important Jewish day school education, regardless of their financial abilities."

## **Donor Spotlight**



Taking Action For Our Future

Chuck and Wendy Siegel have been donors to the Kehillah Fund since 2011. Over the past 12 years, they have given a monthly contribution of \$360, totaling almost \$50,000 to date.

Inspired by a conversation with their Partners in Torah learning partner, the Siegels decided to give maaser (10% of their income to charity). Seeking to invest in Jewish education, they recognized Orthodoxy as the only stream of Judaism that is growing and thriving.

"We feel that parents should be aware that a Jewish education and leading a truly Orthodox life is necessary in order to survive what is going on in the public schools, the media, and in secular homes."

They looked for a foundation they could trust, and one where they could be confident their donations would be going directly toward supporting Jewish education. They found both of these factors in the Kehillah Fund.

Mrs. Siegel began volunteering at one of our 11 schools, Torah Academy of Buffalo Grove, this past year, and her appreciation for the Jewish values taught in a day-school setting has only grown.

The Siegels believe in the importance of taking action. Their message to others—we all need to do something for Jewish continuity and the Jewish future.

Dear Chicago Jewish Community,

I hope that this annual report finds you and your family well. Thank you for sharing our belief in the critical importance of supporting Jewish education.

The Chicago Jewish community has earned a world-renowned reputation for its strength and values. A unique feature of our community, one that simply does not exist anywhere else in the world, is our Kehillah Fund and what it represents: A community joining together to support all of its schools and all of its children.

At the center of the Beis Hamikdash, in the Kodesh Hakadashim (Holy of Holies), was the aron (ark) with the keruvim on top. # **Three Primary Funds**

# Kehillah Fund allocates dollars to our schools through three primary funds:

GENERAL FUND—Reliable monthly distributions provide a baseline of support to our schools. Funds are allocated based on the total number of students enrolled in kindergarten through 8th grade.

ACHDUS FUND—Financial support to bridge the gap in our schools for families who cannot afford to meet their tuition commitment. Funds are allocated per request to each school on an annual basis.

RESOURCE FUND — Supplemental aid to support students with specialized learning needs (i.e. adaptive materials and technology, teacher training, salaries, and more). Funds are allocated annually based on the number of enrolled students in kindergarten through 8th grade.
