Engaging Our Students

Kehillah Fund Schools Nurture the Joy of Learning and Jewish Connection

Partnering with Kehillah Fund, our schools continually seek new ways to inspire students in their education and connection to Torah. Through a wide range of innovative programs—academic, social, and Judaic—both students and teachers have achieved unprecedented success.



Hebrew reading fluency remains an essential focus at Joan Dachs Bais Yaakov (JDBY), and this year's Time for Tehillim Program was a tremendous success. The program was designed to increase students' familiarity with the words of Tehillim, making it easier for them to recite Tehillim in the future. Across grades 2-5, over 360 students challenged themselves to reading Tehillim at home. Both parents and teachers noted an increase in students' fluency across all grade levels, and students reported that they would be excited to take on the challenge again.

Addressing a school-wide need for expanded occupational and speech-language services, **REACH**, a professional development and resource program under the auspices of the Associated Talmud Torahs, was there with support. Early intervention is key, and the expanded program reached more than 1,000 students. The program was a game-changer for teachers, who were able to learn from experts and apply that knowledge in their classrooms.

Shaarei Chinuch Day School brought the joy and wonder of caring for animals to students while instilling the values of responsibility and empathy. Rochel Atkins, a former parent at the school, generously provided quail eggs and an incubator for the students to use. With excitement, the students observed the eggs hatch and are now nurturing the chicks. Through this experience, they have learned the value of pets as wonderful additions to life and the importance of taking care of the world that Hashem has given us.

An expanded Mishmar program is helping boys at Arie Crown Hebrew Day School cover more ground in Talmud and Mishnah, while giving older boys a place to review schoolwork, do Limudei Kodesh homework, and study for tests. With extended hours and days, the program, located at Adas Yeshurun, has answered parents' requests for higher levels of learning and helped students connect and learn face-to-face following a COVID-era increase in screen time.

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When we see the monthly debit from our account, we are happy, knowing that we are joining our community in support of our community's schools.

Observing how Hillel Torah North Suburban Day School students relate differently to various parts of the day, Rabbi Michael Friedman developed a new curriculum called "בכל דרכיך" (In All Your Ways). Rabbi Friedman aimed to showcase how other areas of learning could be applied to Judaism and Torah. The program brings Torah topics to life while exploring how STEM can be used to deepen our understanding of Torah, foster emunah, and enhance our appreciation of Hashem's world.

Mrs. Chana Greenberg, a Resource Specialist at Cheder Lubavitch Hebrew Day School, understands the importance of robust phonemic awareness skills in helping children decode words—an essential foundation for reading and writing. As a result, she introduced the Heggerty Phonemic Awareness program to Pre-1A and



1st-grade classes. Engaging and interactive activities, such as rhyming games, have significantly enhanced the students' ability to dissect sounds in words and reassemble them. Students have also started reading and spelling basic short vowel words.

In the aftermath of the challenging pandemic years, Keshet has increased resources to bolster students' mental health and socialization. An art therapist now collaborates with small groups of students from every grade level to delve into emotions and experiment with new communication methods. To provide middle school students with socialization opportunities they missed during remote learning, Keshet has combined recess

with a local school for grades 6-8. The school reports that these new programs are nearly the most popular coming in second only to therapy dog visits.

At Yeshiva Ohr Boruch, Menahel Rabbi Heshy Forster initiated a structured recess program to assist children in navigating the social aspects of play, such as learning to lose or take turns without frustration. A staff member now organizes activities for students in grades 1-6. The younger grades frequently participate in running games like tag or capture the flag, while the older grades engage in sports such as basketball or football. The boys now enjoy wholesome play with increased exercise, reduced arguments, and inclusive participation.



As part of their Lemudei Chol program, grades 3-5 at JCFS Knapp Yeshiva participated in a collaborative game arcade STEM project. Students built their own games using simple materials such as cardboard, tape, string, and other supplies. They then showcased their arcade, complete with prizes, to other classes at the school. This teacher-driven initiative provided valuable hands-on experience, enhancing fine motor coordination, socialemotional skills, and understanding of mathematical and physical concepts.

Students at Torah Academy of Buffalo Grove now have a dedicated space for davening, thanks to the transformation of a back warehouse currently under renovation. Now, every morning, 39 elementary students begin their day with joyful tefillah in a formal shul setting, complete with beautiful chairs, enhancing their kavanah and connection to Hashem. Additionally, the students' proficiency in tefillah has advanced tremendously as a result. After davening, Rabbi Holman teaches the children Shabbos zemiros, songs from the Haggadah, or a Mishnah from Pirkei Avos.

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The Kehillah Fund inspires the united support of our community which ensures a diverse set of incredible educational options for our children. Our children deserve that.

The Achdus Fund

Vital Support for Day School Families

Although our community strives to make Jewish education accessible for all, the tuition burden remains a significant challenge for many families, especially in light of recent inflation. The Achdus Fund is designed to help day schools support families in need, distributing funding annually based on schools' requests. In 2022, the Kehillah Fund distributed \$79,640 in Achdus funding for 181 students, making a difference for 87 families.

Arie Crown Hebrew Day School turns no child away due to financial constraints. But for families experiencing severe struggles, "the Achdus Fund has been a tremendous resource," says Sam Medow, Executive Director. "The support gives families the comfort to know they have community partners to help."

At Joan Dachs Bais Yaakov–Yeshivas Tiferes Tzvi (JDBY-YTT), where the Fund supported 42 students in 2022, Mrs. Ahuva Wainhaus, JDBY Menaheles shared, "The Achdus Fund is very helpful to families that struggle to pay minimum tuition." One JDBY parent wrote, "Thank you for advocating on my behalf! Bezras Hashem I hope I can get back to doing it myself!"

Because the Achdus Fund is there for families, schools like Hillel Torah North Suburban Day School are able to fund critical school resources, enrichment, and faculty professional development. "The Achdus Fund is a wonderful resource," says Dov Shandolov, Hillel Torah Business Administrator. "It allows schools to focus on the education of our students. Since its inception, Kehillah Fund has been a leading innovator in school funding that other models across the country have tried to emulate."

Why We Said Yes to Kehillah Fund

My long-standing connection to Kehillah Fund goes back to 2005, when my husband Harlan and I received a personal invitation from Nesanel Siegal to join an initiative supporting Chicago's Orthodox day schools. Going Above and Beyond for Jewish Education



Eli and Baila Berkovich, proud parents of four children, reside in West Rogers Park. Three of their children attend Arie Crown Hebrew Day School, with their youngest not yet in day school. The

Berkovich family has generously supported the Kehillah Fund for the past 15 years.

Last year, Eli and Baila deepened their commitment to the Kehillah Fund by becoming ambassadors for the organization's second annual crowdfunding campaign. Initially hesitant, Baila found herself stepping out of her comfort zone. "I thought we'd only do some light social media posting, but in the end, we surprised ourselves," Baila shared.

The couple discovered they made a formidable team. Embracing the process wholeheartedly, Eli particularly enjoyed the friendly competition and sense of urgency throughout the 36-hour campaign. Their combined efforts led to impressive success: they increased their fundraising goal during the campaign and ultimately raised over \$5,000 from 37 donors—the highest number of donors secured by an ambassador team. Eli and Baila deeply value the Kehillah Fund's mission of serving all K-8 schools in our community. "It's wonderful that we're all working toward one goal: providing kids with a wholesome Torah education. It felt great to be part of that."

For Eli, who originally hails from Belarus and relocated to Chicago with his family at age four, the experience held particular significance. "Growing up, I was told how challenging it was to be Jewish in Russia. Two generations of my family missed out on Jewish education. Now, I am grateful to have the opportunity to provide that for my children."

From their initial hesitance, Eli and Baila have transformed into passionate advocates, eager to inspire others to join Kehillah Fund's upcoming campaigns. Their unwavering passion and commitment to the Kehillah Fund stand as an example of the profound impact community support can have, underscoring the vital importance of investing in the future of Jewish education.

Three Primary Funds

Kehillah Fund allocates dollars to our schools through three primary funds:

GENERAL FUND—Reliable monthly distributions provide a baseline of support to our schools. Funds are allocated based on the total number of students enrolled in kindergarten through 8th grade.

ACHDUS FUND—Financial support to bridge the gap in our schools for families who cannot afford to meet their tuition commitment. Funds are allocated per request to each school on an annual basis.

RESOURCE FUND—Supplemental aid to support students with specialized learning needs (i.e. adaptive materials and technology, teacher training, salaries, and more). Funds are allocated based on the number of enrolled students in kindergarten through 8th grade.
